

LEA Plan for Safe Return to In-Person Instruction and Continuity of Service Pursuant to the Federal American Rescue Plan Act, Section 2001(i)

Introduction and Background

As announced in the New Jersey Department of Education (NJDOE)'s <u>April 28, 2021 broadcast</u>, in March 2021 President Biden signed the Federal <u>American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act</u>, Public Law 117-2, into law. The ARP Act provides an additional \$122 billion in Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ARP ESSER) to States and school districts to help safely reopen, sustain the safe operation of schools, and address the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on the nation's students. As with the previous ESSER funds available under the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act, and the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CRRSA), the purpose of the additional funding is to support local educational agencies (LEAs) in preparing for and responding to the impacts of COVID-19 on educators, students, and families. Section 2001(i)(1) of the ARP Act requires each LEA that receives ARP ESSER funds to develop and make publicly available on the LEA's website, no later than 30 days after receiving ARP ESSER funds, a plan for the safe return to in-person instruction and continuity of services for all schools (Safe Return Plan) A Safe Return Plan is required of all fund recipients, including those that have already returned to in-person instruction. Section 2001(i)(2) of the ARP Act further requires that the LEA seek public comment on the Safe Return Plan and take those comments into account in finalization of the Safe Return Plan. Under the interim final requirements published in Volume 86, No. 76 of the Federal Register by the U.S. Department of Education (USDE), an LEA must periodically, but no less frequently than every six months through September 30, 2023, review and, as appropriate, revise its Safe Return Plan.

Pursuant to those requirements, **LEAs must submit to the NJDOE** and **post on their website their Safe Return Plans by June 24, 2021.** The NJDOE intends to make LEA ARP ESSER Fund applications available in EWEG on May 24, 2021 and LEAs will submit their Safe Return Plans to the NJDOE via EWEG. To assist LEAs with the development of their Safe Return Plans, the NJDOE is providing the following template.

This template incorporates the federally-required components of the Safe Return Plan. The questions in the template below will be included in the LEA ARP ESSER Fund application in EWEG. LEAs will submit responses to the questions within the LEA ARP ESSER Fund application in EWEG by June 24, 2021. The NJDOE hopes that this template will allow LEAs to effectively plan for that submission and to easily post the information to their websites as required by the ARP Act.

Note that on May 17, 2021, Governor Murphy <u>announced</u> that upon the conclusion of the 2020-2021 school year, portions of Executive Order 175 allowing remote learning will be rescinded, meaning that schools will be required to provide full-day, in-person instruction, as they were prior to the

COVID-19 Public Health Emergency. The NJDOE and New Jersey Department of Health will share additional information regarding State requirements or guidance for health and safety protocols for the 2021-2022 school year as it becomes available.

1. Maintaining Health and Safety

For each mitigation strategy listed below (A–H), please describe how the LEA will maintain the health and safety of students, educators, and other staff and the extent to which it has adopted policies, and a description of any such policies, on each of the following safety recommendations established by the CDC.

- A. **Universal and correct wearing of masks:** The district adopted mask-wearing protocols for students, staff, and visitors until March 2022, when the executive order requiring masks expired. Mask wearing continues to be allowed, by choice, for all students, staff, and visitors.
- B. **Physical distancing (e.g., including use of cohorts/podding):** Currently, social distancing is no longer recommended by the DOH and is not being enforced in the Roosevelt Borough Public School District.
- C. **Handwashing and respiratory etiquette:** In many classrooms there are existing handwashing stations prepared with soap. In their absence, alcohol-based hand sanitizers (at least 60% alcohol) are provided. Students are reminded orally and through posted signage to wash hands for at least 20 seconds at regular intervals, including before eating, after using the bathroom, and after blowing their nose/coughing/sneezing. Students are also encouraged to use alcohol-based hand sanitizer (at least 60% alcohol) if washing with soap and water is not possible.
- D. Cleaning and maintaining healthy facilities, including improving ventilation: The district adheres to current and updated CDC and Department of Health facilities cleaning practices and procedures which are frequently updated as changes arise. Cleaning products are EPA-registered and approved and each is utilized according to the directions on the label or as listed in the manufacturer's instructions. Schools throughout the district have adequate ventilation, including operational heating and ventilation systems where appropriate. Recirculated air is complemented

with a fresh air component and windows are opened when recirculated air is not provided. Filters for HVAC units are maintained and changed according to manufacturer recommendations.

- E. Contact tracing in combination with isolation and quarantine, in collaboration with the State, local, territorial, or Tribal health departments:

 The district no longer conducts contact tracing and no longer requires isolation or quarantine.
- F. **Diagnostic and screening testing:** The district provides families with information regarding diagnostic and screening testing and encourages individuals to get tested as appropriate.
- G. **Efforts to provide vaccinations to educators, other staff, and students, if eligible:** Vaccinations are readily available to individuals who wish to receive them on their own after consulting with their medical provider.
- H. Appropriate accommodations for children with disabilities with respect to the health and safety policies: The district continues to follow Department of Education guidelines, state laws and regulations, and federal requirements for students with disabilities. All accommodation and modifications are implemented to the greatest extent possible regardless of the modality of instruction employed, i.e., virtual or in-person.

2. Ensuring Continuity of Services

A. Describe how the LEA will ensure continuity of services, including but not limited to services to address students' academic needs and students' and staff's social, emotional, mental health, and other needs, which may include student health and food services. (1000 character limit): The district continues to meet its obligations to students with disabilities to the greatest extent possible regardless of the mode of instruction, i.e. in-person or virtual. Case managers, teachers, and support staff continue to implement modifications and accommodations as prescribed by each individual student's IEP, guidance from the NJDOE, and any/all additional guidance from the United States Department of Education (USDE) on implementation of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). The district has ensured that every student has access to a computing device and internet connectivity and all known issues among our student body have been remedied. The district has a full staff committed to delivering the curriculum and administering assessments as appropriate. All schools have building staff capacity to deliver highly effective instruction in virtual and in-person environments. The staff is also prepared to address learning gaps that might prevent students from meeting grade-level New Jersey Student Learning Standards (NJSLS).

. Public Comment

- A. Describe how the LEA sought public comment on its plan, and how it took those public comment into account in the development of its plan. (1000 character limit): The district presented its original Safe Reopening Plan at its public Board of Education meeting in October 2021. The district also presented revised plans at its public Board of Education meeting on June 23, 2022, February 23, 2023 and currently on November 30, 2023. During these meetings, public comment is permitted as indicated on the agenda; and a copy of this plan is continuously available to the public on the district website. In addition, stakeholders were given the opportunity to provide feedback on the existing Safe Reopening Plan in the ARP/ESSER survey.
- B.
